Frozen Banana Treats

Ingredients

- 3 medium bananas
- 1 cup dark chocolate chips
- 2 teaspoons butter
- Optional toppings: Chopped peanuts, desiccated coconut and/or sprinkles



Directions:

- Cut each banana crosswise into 6 pieces (about 1 in. thick).
- Insert a toothpick into each piece; transfer to a grease proof paperlined baking sheet.
- Freeze until completely firm, about 1 hour.
- In a microwave, melt chocolate and butter; stir until smooth.
- Dip banana pieces in chocolate mixture; allow excess to drip off.
- Dip in toppings as desired; return to baking sheet.
- Freeze at least 30 minutes before serving.

Gardening Tips

Here we are with the year seemingly galloping by. Where does the time go to? This month's edition covers two months, so it is straight on to suggestions for activities over the next couple of months:

For August:

1) One of the main jobs this month is to ensure that we harvest all vegetables as they ripen. Peas, beans and courgettes are at their best when young and tender and the plants will stop producing if too many 'fruits' are allowed to mature. If necessary, give away surplus produce rather than leave them on the plant.

2} With the recent downpours we have been having (up to mid-July) we should not be having any trouble keeping root vegetables well-watered. However, should we get the dry period forecast, then the crops should not be allowed to dry out. Sudden rains after a dry spell causes a surge of growth that will cause them to split.

3} We should also be thinking about what vegetable seeds we can sow in August:

- a. Lettuce can be sown now and provide pickings from mid to late autumn. Be prepared to provide protection when night temperatures drop.
- b. Sow Japanese onions and spring onions now in rows 9 inches apart.
- c. Sow summer and winter radishes now. The winter variety will remain quite happily in the ground to be used in cold-weather salads.
- d. Finally, short-rooted carrots can be sown, as can spring cabbage seeds, ready for transplanting later.

For September:

This is the month to harvest in, but it is also the time to plan ahead and start sowing the vegetables that will provide valuable winter harvests and early spring and summer pickings. The soil will still be warm so seeds germinate quickly.

1} Spring cabbage and spinach can be sown now for picking next spring. You may have to cover the spinach as nights become cooler.

2} Salad crops can also be sown to harvest in the coming weeks. They can be grown in a sheltered spot outdoors or grown in pots and containers. A favourite is 'Winter Density'.

3} Sowing broad beans in autumn means plants can establish over winter and crop earlier next spring. Try broad bean 'Aquadulce Claudia'.

4) Radishes mature in just a couple of weeks so it is worth sowing a late batch of seeds now for a later crop.

And finally, a word from a real gardening expert:

"When weeding, the best way to make sure you are removing a weed and not a valuable plant, is to pull on it. If it comes out of the ground easily, it is a valuable plant".

Apologies: Apologies were accepted from Cllr Pritchard and from County Cllr Bowkett

Present: Cllrs Lawrence, Pavely, Edwards, Cooper, Sherriff and Bolland (Chairman)

Also present: There were seven members of the pubic present, they came along to voice objections to the planning application that is on the agenda. Notes were taken of the objections and the members of the public left the meeting.

Reports from Representatives in Outside Bodies

The County Cllr and the District Cllrs were not present.

Planning

The Parish Council looked at and **OBJECTED** to the following planning application:

S/169/01314/21 - Inizio Limited - Erection of 4 detached bungalows, 3 detached houses and 2 detached houses with attached garages (9 dwellings in total) with associated garages. Erection of fencing to maximum height of 1.8 metres. Construction of vehicular access and internal access roads and associated infrastructure works at Land adjacent to Perivale, Main Road.

There is an existing problem with both surface water causing flooding and with the sewerage system overflowing into dykes. This site will be over developed with nine properties. Should permission be given can the properties backing onto the existing properties on Main Road be bungalows.

Planning Decisions received

FULL planning permission has been received for:

S/169/00637/21 - Mrs M Caddamy - Consent to display 1 retractable awning/canopy at Stickney Bakery and Café, Main Road

<u>Highways</u>

The footway by the Church and along towards the picnic site has overhanging trees that need to be cut back. They are low and catching residents heads as they use the footway. The public footpath from Midville Lane to the footbridge is impassable due to a leaning fence.
