Gardening Tips for July

I'm not too sure about 'flaming June'! Last week the central-heating automatically came on as it was so cold, and I must say the electric-blanket is a welcome comfort some nights. However, we are promised a warm blast for the end of this week so here are a few jobs to be getting on with which will make the most of the improvement in our weather.

- 1) There is still plenty of successional sowing to be getting on with. Whether from modules or direct into the ground, sowings done now will ensure supplies of vegetables and salads right through into Autumn. Think of French and runner beans, beetroot, carrots, courgettes and marrows, and of course, brassicas for starters. If you are feeling adventurous, sowings of turnips, swedes and sweetcorn will pay dividends.
- 2} Leeks, which have been sown and grown in a seed bed until it's time to transplant them, should be ready to go into permanent position soon. Place them in a deep hole, made with a dibber, which will encourage long blanched stems and then water the plants well so soil and water flood the planting hole. When planting leeks, the latest received wisdom, is not to follow the old advice of chopping the top foliage and roots back, as it apparently doesn't do any good.
- 3) Cut-and-come again salads, pea shoots and microgreens are easy to grow. Make new sowings every few weeks.
- 4) When you have picked your early peas, it is best to cut down the top growth after harvesting. If space is not a pressure, you can leave roots in the soil to let them return valuable nitrogen to it. Then plant out your nutrient hungry crops like cabbage into the space.
- 5} If we do get the promised spell of warm weather, then watering can become an issue. Water loss can be reduced and time saved by mulching using organic matter to preserve moisture or by hoeing which kills the weeds and also breaks up the top of the soil preventing water being drawn to the surface by capillary action and evaporating.

Crunchy Granola Pretzel Sticks


Ingredients

- 1 cup granola without raisins


Directions

At the start of the Platinum Jubilee celebration week the Union Flag was raised on top of the church tower to mark this special occasion, this received some welcome comments from many observers.

On Thursday a Jubilee coffee morning and nearly new sale was held at St Luke's Church. The event was well supported with all attending enjoying coffee, cake and a chat. Before leaving a sherry toast was made to her Majesty and the national anthem was sung.

The Youth Centre was decorated with bunting and patriotic flags ready for the Friday night Bingo, small flags on each table also added to the majestic nature of the evening. A special cake was made and decorated with piped icing to represent the union flag, this was cut during the evening and enjoyed by many of the players.

The Big picnic was arranged on the William Lovell Sports field on Saturday the 4th June to celebrate the Queens Jubilee, the weather was fine and calm but not quite so hot as the previous day. The school ground and sports hall were made available by kind permission of the Academy's management and the care taker, who had brought over some tables and chairs for us to use. Instead, a penalty goal shoot through a car tyre was set up and this proved very popular with the competitive youngers and also some parents. 

ANNUAL PARISH MEETING HELD ON WEDNESDAY 25 MAY 2022 IN THE YOUTH CENTRE, HALL LANE

Apologies have been received from Mrs Edwards

Present: Four members of the public, Dist Cllr Jones, County Cllr Bowkett, Mr Johnson from Witham fourth IDB and M Bolland (Chairman of the Parish Council)

Minutes of the Annual Parish Meetings held remotely on 01 April 2021

The Clerk read out the minutes, it was proposed by Mrs Sherriff and seconded by the Chairman that the minutes be signed as a true record.

Chairman's annual report:

"Welcome to our Annual Parish Meeting.

This time last year we were on our last Zoom meeting. On the whole they were a successful way of conducting Parish business, especially the finances that had to be kept up to date in order for the Council to function. There were one or two blips when someone's Wi-Fi went down and on one occasion it would, under no circumstances, let me in, fortunately, we did not have any Jackie Weaver moments, so that was a bonus. Lots of Councils are badgering the Government to allow all Council meetings to be held on Zoom. It would save money, but I am not really a fan so I'm hoping that the Government stands firm on meeting in person. I suppose if they gave us the choice then it could be useful in bad weather to save the worry of driving on bad roads or cancelling altogether.

In April new batteries were ordered for the defibrillator as well as new pads. However it was to be a long time before we were able to be supplied with them as it would seem they were out of stock. Monthly checks will now be made to make sure it is in working order.

The cemetery trees were checked to see if there were any major problems. When the report came back there were only a few small jobs that needed to be done, none of which could be tackled during the nesting season.

In June we met for the first time in two years face to face, it was really great. There were quite a few financial jobs to carry out, to sign off the last years finances to send to the auditor.

The seats on the junior swings were replaced. Parking problems at the schools were discussed yet again, but there doesn't seem to be an easy solution. We received complaints about some anti-social behaviour which was handed on to East Lindsey as it was their territory.

We have had problems with HSBC as they have closed their counter service and are now charging us for all transactions, including cheques. We decided to transfer to Lloyds, but that proved a bit problematic as they were not taking new Councils on, but we are pursuing this option.

We discussed getting Jubilee medals for all primary school age children and those under five years of age. When we looked into it it actually made more sense to buy mugs where we could put Stickney Parish Council on each one.

There have been lots of planning applications which we have looked at carefully and made any comments that might enhance the areas, but in the grand scheme of things we do not have a lot of sway. Finding reasons to block building is very problematical so we haven't had much luck with people's objections.

We reported the need for new signs at Horbling Lane and Hall Lane and they have finally been done after a long wait.

Before lockdown we were meeting in the bungalow at the Rest Home where they allowed us to use it free as we could not use the Youth Centre after 30 years there it was then let to someone else. Because of COVID we could not ask to go back to the Rest Home and as the Youth Centre was no longer in use on the first Thursday we decided to return.

In September it was decided that our next meeting would be at Eastville, Midville & New Leake Village Hall to save the Council £150.00 per year. When I first joined the Parish Council we met at the school, it was free but then they decided to charge for the caretaker, and it wasn't cheap. The then Village Hall Committee offered us the Youth Centre and as we were meeting for village business, we were offered it for free. We accepted, but at our first meeting we offered to make a contribution for which they were grateful. However, the charges have escalated so much that we needed to try and make some savings. The Youth Centre cost £25 per meeting while at the new venue it is £10.00 and everything is set out for us.

On 11 November we had a Service of Remembrance at the Church War Memorial with quite a few people in attendance. We donated £100.00 to the Royal British Legion and laid a wreath on behalf of the people of Stickney.

Throughout the year we had lots of mundane jobs to do that have to be done regularly, but then it was time to think about Christmas. Should we or shouldn't we put up Christmas lights again. After much discussion it was decided to give it another go. Father Christmas was raring to go so we set about planning. We bought some new lights and were offered a free tree. We were fortunate to have two newcomers to the village, from Stickney Meadows, to put up the lights with the help of George Bolland and Harry Dodds. Darren Moore from East Keal brought the bricks and stone to pack around the tree and Gary Bond and Carla Sabin put it up and attached the lights.

The event itself was the most successful yet in the number of people who attended. There was coffee, tea, squash and cakes all served by Doreen Cooley and Sandra Boone. The children, even the older ones, enjoyed meeting Santa and collecting their goodie bags. Unfortunately, there was no music and that was my fault, with everything going on I forgot all about it. If we do it this year we must try to make it a bit more festive.

We do have a problem with someone cutting the lights. We don't know if it is a vandal or someone who objects to them. It is very frustrating as it is something most people enjoy.

Between Christmas and Easter nothing very special happened. It was a case of noses to the grindstone getting on with the humdrum jobs that need to be done every month.

I need to thank people who work for the village, some of whom get paid. Without their contribution the village would not function as well as it does, thank you to all of them.

Then there are the volunteers who help out, mostly delivering the magazines, Coral Elderfield, Keith Riggall, Maxine Scott, Susan Norkett, Darren Redford and Linda from the Shop. George Bolland looks after the play area, checks the equipment, tidies the area and empties the bins. He also delivers the magazines. A big thank you to them and thank you to Mollyann Sabin and her friend George, Elliemae Sabin and Dylan Sabin who, when they can, help to deliver some of the magazines.

I must thank all the Councillors who come to the meetings and help when they can. Thank you also to the District and County Councillors who also come along every month to keep us informed about what is happening in the upper tier of East Lindsey and Lincolnshire County Council. They are also able to help us with any problems that we may have that we, as a Council, cannot deal with.

Finally, I must thank Mrs Arnold, the Parish Clerk, without whom the Council cannot function. She is there to make sure that we do everything as it should be done as well as working very hard on your behalf.

I am going to finish on a very sad note. A few months ago Ken Burman died very suddenly at home. He was on the Parish Council for many years and became Chairman as I started on the Parish Council. He did a brilliant job for many years before he decided to retire. He will be missed by his family and all who knew him as a friend.

Three weeks ago a serving Councillor, Frank Cooper, died very unexpectedly. There was no sign that he had any serious problems. You can imagine my shock when a lady telephoned to let me know that this had happened, unfortunately I could not see her as I had COVID. I did offer help on behalf of the Council and asked her to let me know when the funeral was, but I have heard nothing yet. She explained that she did not live in Stickney but did not say where she lived so it is possible that the funeral is somewhere else. Frank travelled a lot, even going to Wales to see his dentist. He also travelled for work. He was very knowledgeable and brought a lot to the Parish Council in his unassuming way, he will be sadly missed."

Speaker: Mr Johnson of Witham Fourth IDB

Mr Johnson gave a very interesting talk about the Witham Fourth IDB, the finances and the works they carry out in and around Stickney to keep the land from flooding. There was time available for some questions, mainly asked about commenting on planning applications for the area and if there was any enforcement for access to dykes.

Report From County Cllr Bowkett

"Good evening

It is a pleasure to be here in person for the 2022 annual meeting.

The past 2 years have been very hard for all of us but hopefully we seem to have turned a corner and are learning to live with Covid, rates are starting to drop around the county which is good news for everyone.

It is a year since I was re-elected as your County Councillor and was promoted to the portfolio holder for Adult Care and Public Health for Lincolnshire.

To say it has been a busy year is an understatement, as undertaking training and getting up to speed with the role has not been easy but I can say it's the most challenging but most rewarding job I have ever undertaken.

We all have seen the news with the terrible atrocities in the Ukraine, it is an unimaginable situation, and many Ukraine families are seeking refuge until the war ends.

In Lincolnshire we have welcomed 150 families so far with a further 150 on the way, all families are helped with finance, doctors, schools etc, to try and ease them to settle in.

The placements are for 6 months in the first instance, when the situation will be reviewed in the Ukraine to see if families can return home.

Lincolnshire County Council have started their first grass cut and weed spray around the district. A further grass cut will be done later in the year also two further weed sprays.

We are finally getting caught up with a backlog of road repairs. We have dealt with up to eight months of potholes which had built up due to staff shortages, but with extra gangs being brought in from out of area there has been a huge catch up.

Any issues residents have you can download Fixmystreet on your phone or go on the LCC website and report, not only road issues but also fly tipping, blocked drains, dykes, dangerous trees, abandoned cars and any other issue that LCC would deal with.

Lots of my rural roads need urgent work and I am working with my highways officer to see if any can be put into the retread programme, this programme can work well on roads that don't have heavy volumes of traffic.

The final two stages of the Fodder Dyke improvements should take place in the summer and autumn, and this should complete the three-year programme.

The coming year is going to be hard for many people with bills soaring, there is help and support out there. You can go on **gov.uk** website where you can find information and help, or you can call **03451 212032**. Alternatively, you can give me a call and I will try to help.

Finally, I would like to thank you for your support, it is much appreciated and look forward to the coming year."
