

Kiddies Corner

Chocolate Rice Crispy Cake

Ingredients

- 150g rice snaps
- 100g unsalted butter, plus a little extra to grease
- 1 x 100g bag mini pink and white marshmallows
- 300g silky milk chocolate, chopped into small pieces



Method

- 1. Grease and line a 21cm square tin with non-stick baking paper. In a large pan, melt the butter, marshmallows and 100g chocolate over a low heat, until the mixture is fully melted and combined. Stir in the rice snaps and mix until the snaps are completely coated.
- 2. Turn out into the lined tin and using the back of a spoon, smooth the top to make it flat. Melt the remaining chocolate in a heatproof bowl set over a pan of simmering water, stirring, until completely melted and smooth.
- 3. Pour the melted chocolate over the rice snaps, spread evenly and leave to set. Once set, cut into 25 squares to serve.

Gardening Tips for May:

The days are definitely getting longer but not appreciably warmer. There is still a risk of frost but as we get further into the month of May this risk will all but diminish. It's still a good idea to monitor the weather forecast ready to provide protection in the form of fleece or cloches. So here are a few ideas of what to be doing in the vegetable garden as we wait for some truly warm days.

- 1) Weeds will obviously be making an appearance so keep hoeing to keep them under control. I saw a good tip the other day which said, that 'if you hoe before you see a weed, you won't see a weed,' sounds good to me. Best do it on a dry sunny day (remember those?) which will prevent the weeds re-establishing themselves.
- 2) Keep an eye open for pests and diseases and be prepared to take the necessary action. Greenfly begin to make an appearance this month and some early caterpillars may also be about.
- 3) As rows of vegetables hopefully start to appear they will need to be thinned to prevent too much competition for space and moisture. To minimise disturbance, cut the unwanted seedlings off at the ground level rather than pull them up. It is a good idea to water thoroughly after thinning, to settle the remaining seedlings.
- 4) The main crops to be sown this month are hardy runner and French beans, sweet corn, courgettes and outdoor cucumbers.
- 5) Make successional sowings of lettuces, carrots, salad onions and radishes.
- 6) Next winter's brassicas, such as Savoys and winter cabbage and sprouts, should be sown in seed beds for planting out when large enough in about a month's time.
- 7} Continue to earth up potatoes. This is multi-beneficial in killing any weeds that might have grown up amongst the growing potatoes and also prevents the young tubers from being exposed to the light and becoming green and inedible. More tubers will be encouraged to grow from the underground section of the stem while at the same time protecting the exposed tender growth from being caught by any late frosts.

In conclusion, an observation from an unknown source:

Which could be countered with:

'Gardening is cheaper than therapy, until your spouse adds up the receipts!.'

THIS MEETING WAS FOLLOWED BY THE ANNUAL PARISH MEETING

Apologies have been received from Mrs Edwards

Present: Thirteen members of the public, three Parish Councillors Dist Cllrs Ashton and Jones, County Cllr Bowkett, and M Bolland (Chairman of the Parish Council)

The Chairman read out the annual report:

"Welcome to our Annual Parish Meeting.

Now is the time when we look back over the past year. Most of the year has been spent dealing with mundane jobs that keep everything in the village ticking over, for example paying bills and making sure we get value for your money.

It has been a year of planning application. There have been so many that it is hard to keep up with them. As there are strict criteria for objecting to any plans we have found it very difficult to put in any meaningful objections to most of them.

There is the ongoing saga of the 30mph speed limit on the A16. It is a long time since it was decided that there could be a limit at the north end of the village, but we are still waiting for the signs to be put up. For reasons, known only to the powers that be, a 30mph limit has been rejected for the car boot end of the A16. We will keep pushing for the limit to be extended as with the car boot traffic and all the new builds with cars wanting to enter the A16 it really seems like an accident, or accidents, waiting to happen.

There is still no time or place given for the siting of the crossing that was promised some time ago.

For the Queen's Platinum Jubilee it was decided to buy a mug celebrating the event for all the children in the primary and pre-schools and for any child in the age range who lived in the village, but did not attend either of the schools.

We held our annual Remembrance Day Service on 11 November at the War Memorial. It was well attended this year. Refreshments were served in the Church afterwards and there was a nice display of knitted poppies on view.

It was decided to have the Christmas lights again on 08 December. The switch-on was quite well attended, Father Christmas made an appearance and the children could talk to him, he gave them each a bag of goodies which they were delighted with. There was cake, coffee, tea, juice and mulled wine – a pleasant time was had by all.

We must thank Darren Redford, Ian Chevrall and George Bolland for putting up the lights and decorating the tree. When it was all over they took then down again. This year the lights were all intact so they will be used again this Christmas. We mustn't forget to thank Father Christmas for dropping in.

When it came to setting the precept we managed to keep it down, with the cost of living crisis we did not wish to add to the burden.

With the King's Coronation coming up it has been decided to give the primary school aged children a coin and a bookmark for them to keep as a momento.

For a long time we have been meeting at the village hall in New Leake. This was because there was a karate class in our Youth Centre on a Thursday which is the only convenient time for all the Councillors to meet. Because of COVID it was felt that it was not safe to meet at the Old Rectory, however as COVID is not so rampant we are now meeting at the Old Rectory so it is more convenient for anyone wanting to come to a meeting to discuss any problems they may have.

We have a lot of thank you's to say, especially to people who volunteer to help. Every month people volunteer to deliver the Stickney News, they are Keith Riggall, Maxine Scott, Susan Norkett, Linda Wooding, Darren Redford and Derek Smith, George Bolland and Elliemae, Dylan ad Mollyann Sabin who help when they can. George also clears the park and checks the equipment.

A thank you to the grass cutters who keep the play park and the cemetery looking good and to the handyman who looks after the church clock and does other jobs as and when they are needed.

I mustn't forget to thank all the Councillors who come along every month so we can carry out all the work necessary to keep everything ticking along nicely. Our two District Councillors and our County Councillor also come along to keep us updated on what is happening higher up the chain.

Finally we must thank Mrs Arnold, the Parish Clerk, without whom we would not be able to function so well. As well as keeping us on the right path she does most of the 'donkey work' involved in running the Parish Council."

Speaker: Dist Cllr Ashton, ELDC Portfolio Holder for Planning

Cllr Ashton gave an interesting talk about the Local Plan, how it works within the National Planning Policy Framework and alongside Neighbourhood Plans. Central Government want ELDC to have a five year forward supply of housing, this has to be taken into consideration within the Local Plan. Flooding is an issue that must be considered as well as sustainability of all areas in the District. The possibility of an Appeal has to be considered when making planning decisions, hence land that is not marked for development may, in some circumstances, still get permission for development. The Government are considering

that a 10% net gain for bio-diversity be put in place when developers put in a planning application, this is a good thing in practice, but may take funding from S106 agreements.

Cllr Ashton was asked about the housing allocation for Stickney, he will advise the Clerk when he has the figures. A question was asked about eco-built properties having wood burners installed, if there is an issue then Environmental Health would deal with this. The dykes are being filled in around Stickney Meadows, Cllr Ashton will ask for more details after the meeting. The lack of a decent bus service, shopping facilities and recreation for young people was reported, but these are not planning issues.

Residents are concerned about the numbers increasing using the surgery where there are already problems for existing patients, also concerns as to whether the school can cope with any additional children. Whilst the school and the surgery report that they can cope, then their comments have to be accepted. Developers make considerable funds available for the NHS and for education via S106 agreements, agreed prior to planning permission being given.

<u>Dist Cllr Jones</u> reported that Stickney is a 'large village' and will be a place for development, any objections sent to ELDC should be valid objections. Just not wanting something cannot be a valid objection. There is currently very little happening at ELDC due to being in the pre-election period.

County Cllr Bowkett introduced herself and reported:

"It has been a pleasure to work with you over the past year, as always your support is greatly received and working together we can get things done.

Speeding through the village is still an issue and we must press together for the PCSOs and now also LCC highways team to do regular speed checks around the village.

I was pleased to bring Cllr Davies and my highways officer to see the issues we have with parking outside both schools, and a discussion on the siting of the zebra crossing along with the positioning of the yellow and white lines outside both schools and the Main Road. Hopefully the renewed road markings will help reduce dangerous parking.

The speed reduction signage for the A16 is being designed and should be in place by the summer at the latest, I apologise for the delay in this matter.

In our budget this year a total of £93 million has been put into highways, which includes an extra £7 million which LCC have added to the budget received from government. This will help enormously in improving safety, especially on our unclassified roads. Any issues you see around your community, with pot holes, drainage, street lighting, to name a few, please report in on Fix my Street or call highways.

In my role as Adult Care and Public Health Exec member, we have secured £4 million pounds to further the work with Alcohol and drug treatment across the county. This is very important work and I am saddened to say since COVID there is a real problem with excessive alcohol consumption, so hopefully this help can reach even more people than before. The Adult Care budget for this next financial year is £169 million and the budget for Children's services is £98 million these are statuary services but just show you how much money is needed to run our County services.

The latest COVID booster vaccine is now available for the over 75's or anyone with a weakened immune system, you should be contacted to book by the NHS app, you can go on the NHS.gov website to book, or call 119 free of charge.

Please as always contact me with any issues."

<u>Any Other Business</u> – open to members of the public

Issues regarding litter around the village were raised. It was suggested that hi-viz vests be sought and litter pickers and arrange a volunteer litter picking day.

A resident reported a number of issues near to a property, County Cllr Bowkett is aware of the situation and the matter is in hand with the relevant authorities.

In answer to another question it was confirmed that the planning application for 50 properties, a shop and four industrial units has not yet been decided.
