Fun and healthy recipe ideas for kids

FRUITY PIZZA

Have you ever had a fruity pizza? It's such a simple idea, perfect for a summer's day, so easy to do and a fun way to offer your little one a chance to try new fruits and new tastes!

Firstly, slice the largest fruit you can find (melon or apple) across its middle to create the pizza base. Next cover the 'base' with sliced fruit and berries and enjoy!





CHEESY FEET

All this recipe requires is three ingredients and just twelve minutes cooking time.

The ingredients are: 75g grated cheddar cheese 150g self-raising flour 100g salted butter, chilled and cubed

<u>Method</u>

1. Grate the cheese into a large bowl, although save a little to sprinkle on top.

2. Add the flour and butter and using your fingers rub all the ingredients together until it forms into a ball of dough.

3. Tip the dough out onto a lightly floured surface and roll it out, although not too thick, about 5mm should do.

4. Encourage your little one to stand on a piece of paper. Then, draw around their foot, cut out the shape and put this on top of the dough.

5. Cut around the foot shape.

6. Place the 'feet' onto the baking tray and sprinkle each using the remaining grated cheese.

7. Bake at 160° for 10-12 minutes until golden. Allow to cool before serving.

There you have it: delicious, cheesy feet!

By providing safe places for hedgehogs to live, you're much more likely to see these prickly creatures in your garden.



Sadly the number of hedgehogs in the UK has plummeted over recent years. While there were estimated to be around 1.5 million in 1995, today there is believed to be less than 500,000.

Hedgehogs need homes just like humans, so making one for them is a great way to encourage them into your garden. Hedgehogs are becoming increasingly reliant on urban and suburban gardens. Urban populations of hedgehogs have increased by up to a third, while rural populations have halved. This decline is likely caused by the loss and degradation of our habitats due to pressures such as development, agricultural intensification and climate change.

So, whether you live in town or country, you can help to look after garden wildlife like hedgehogs by providing food, water and shelter. The cross section above give an idea of what you could do for hedgehogs.

Pick a shady, quiet spot to put your hedgehog house. Lift the lid off the house, and put the dry leaves inside.

Cover the lid with polythene sheeting (making sure it's still accessible for cleaning later on), and pack soil and dead leaves around the outside, leaving the entrance free of debris.

Clear out the hedgehog house once a year (late March to early April) to prevent the build-up of pests. Do not clean it out if a hedgehog is in residence though!

Making a log pile or compost heap are also good options for providing space for hedgehogs to nest, and have the added bonus of attracting lots of insects for them to eat!

Cemetery Garden of Remembrance

Would residents leaving pots and artificial flowers in the ground around the memorial plaques in the Garden of Remembrance please remove them.

The flower vases are for the use of anyone who wishes to leave flowers for their loved ones, do please use them.

Any pots or artificial flowers left around the plaques after the end of July will be removed.

Pots and vases placed on the plaques will scratch the surface and eventually damage them.

Artificial flowers around one plaque may encourage others to place them around other plaques which are not easily accessible without standing on some plaques.

A note for everyone who places wreaths in the Garden of Remembrance – please be aware that metal in the base of a wreath will affect the gold lettering on a plaque, other bases will be available and will not cause any damage.

Gardening Tips for August & September:

Well here we are, in the middle of July (as I write these notes!) without anything resembling a Summer. It is not even as if we're promised any upturn in the sunshine stakes. Perhaps it will be a good Autumn! In the meantime, here are a few activities in the vegetable garden to consider while we await an improvement in the weather.

August:

1} Lettuce is a surprisingly resilient crop making it an ideal vegetable to plant during August. If we do get any warm days, it is best to sow in the evening as germination is poor when it is hot. Sow thinly and thin further as required.

2) Spinach. If you sow spinach in late August, it will be ready to pick by October. It then enters dormancy over winter, ready to provide a fresh crop of leaves in early spring. Sow into well prepared fertile soil and cover with a cloche when temperatures drop.

3) Rocket. If you like a bit of a kick in your salads, wildrocket sown in early August will provide a crop of fresh leaves before winter. It then also lies dormant until March, when it puts on new growth. Another option is to sow salad rocket which stands a better chance of surviving frosts, and offers more leaves in winter than wild rocket, but often bolts in April.

4} Sow Spring Onions in temperatures below 20c. Sow direct in rows outdoors or in modules with up to 10 seeds in each for a harvestable clump in Spring.

September: There are a few things that you can sow in this month, ranging from turnips and spinach to winter lettuce, onions and broad beans.

1) Garlic sown in Autumn can grow larger bulbs than later sown varieties. Sow from September to early December.

2} Turnips and Radish are a fast growing crop that can be sown in September. After germination and when large enough to handle, thin to about 3 inches apart. The leafy tops of the ones you remove, can be used as greens in stews or added to omelettes.

3) Finally, it might be worthwhile taking a chance on sowing a few carrot seeds. Late August is usually considered the cut-off point for the carrot, but early cultivars, such as Nantes 2, can be sown under a cloche - you won't be bothered by carrot fly!

Lastly, a quote from a Doug Green, an American biologist:

"A vegetable garden doesn't just feed your body. It also feeds your soul."

NOTES FROM THE PARISH COUNCIL MEETING HELD ON THURSDAY 11 JULY 2024

There were seven members of the public present, together with County Cllr Bowkett, who came along to listen and put questions to the representative from the Lincolnshire Road Safety Partnership:

The cost to site a speed camera is in the region of £100,000. An average speed camera will be considered for Stickney, but certain criteria must be met. The speed van will be looked for siting at Main Road from time to time, again depending on the sites available for the criteria to be met.

LRSP are responsible for the siting of cameras, the Police are responsible for enforcement of speeding.

County Cllr Bowkett will ask LCC to consider 30mph road markings in the village.

7.55pm The LRSP representative left the meeting, as did one member of the public.

Issues regarding potholes in Holmes Road were raised, County Cllr Bowkett will deal with this matter.

There is a low Anglian Water drain in the Main Road, this has been reported on Fix my Street. County Cllr Bowkett will look into this.

The entrance to the William Lovell school is badly broken up. No-one is taking responsibility for this land, County Cllr Bowkett is dealing with this.

The new road markings in the area of the A16 Main Road/Hall Lane will be done when the Puffin Crossing is put in place. The crossing, the road markings and the footway sealing is scheduled to take place in October
