# **Kiddies Corner**

#### **Ingredients**

100g unsalted butter, softened

75g caster sugar, plus extra for sprinkling

1 egg, separated

1 small unwaxed lemon, finely grated zest only

200g plain flour, plus extra for dusting

50g currants

1–2 tbsp milk



#### Method

- Preheat the oven 200C/180C Fan/Gas 6. Line three baking trays with baking paper.
- Put the butter and sugar in a bowl and beat until well combined and fluffy. Add the egg yolk and lemon zest. Sift in the flour and mix well. Stir in the currants and enough milk to make a fairly soft dough.
- Knead the dough on a floured work surface and, using a rolling pin, roll out the dough until 5mm thick. Using a 6cm fluted cutter, cut out 24 rounds. Transfer to the baking trays and bake for 8 minutes.
- Lightly beat the egg white using a fork.
- Remove the biscuits from the oven and brush the tops with the beaten egg white. Sprinkle over caster sugar and return to the oven for 5 minutes, or until pale golden brown and cooked though.
- Leave to cool on the trays for a few minutes, then carefully lift onto a wire rack to cool completely.

## **Easter Eggs**


Eggs have always been a symbol of new life and rebirth and the Springtime celebrations at Easter meant eggs quickly became associated with this time of year. Eggs were one of the foods Christians were not allowed to eat during Lent, so an egg on Easter Sunday became a real treat to enjoy.

When the eggs did eventually become sweeter treats, they began as cardboard cutouts filled with little cakes and snacks before fully chocolate eggs became available in the 19th century.

The first chocolate egg to be crafted in the UK was made by J.S. Fry and Sons in 1873. Cadbury had been making chocolate from the 1840s but did not produce an Easter Egg until 1875.

The Guinness Book of Records lists an Italian Easter Egg as the largest ever made. The egg, which stood in a shopping centre in Cortenuova, Lombardy, was over 10m tall and 7,200kg in weight, making it taller than a giraffe and heavier than an elephant.

# **Gardening Tips for April:**


March has again shown how tricky it can be. It is mostly the month when winter says "goodbye" and spring arrives. This year has been no exception and the trick is, as we anticipate the arrival of April, to be ready when the weather allows. So here are a few ideas to be thinking about as we prepare for hopefully warmer and more settled weather.

- 1} Beetroot are easy to grow and come as either globe-shaped or cylindrical varieties. These latter are useful if slicing. Most varieties are red/purple in colour but they also come cream and white. Sow outdoors from March to July to harvest during June to November. The seed is essentially a fruit containing a cluster of seeds although some varieties have a single seed.
- 2) Broccoli. This is sometimes confused with calabrese. However, while the latter is harvested the same year it is sown, broccoli is overwintered. The growing season can thus be the best part of a year, with seeds being sown in April, planted out in early summer and cropped in February/March through to May. They will do best in a sheltered spot, need earthing up to prevent wind rock and will definitely need netting to stop hungry pigeons from stripping them bare. A lot of work, but well worth the trouble.
- 3} Carrots are another worthwhile vegetable and like beetroot, come in various colours and sizes. They need deep fertile soil and will take about 10-12 weeks from sowing to harvesting. They can be grown for an early crop undercover; under cloches; in cold frames or in bags or containers in the greenhouse. Their most serious problem that can affect them is Carrot-fly. The problem is worsened after thinning them as the fly is attracted to the smell. There are a number of possible solutions (thinning late in the day and a hasty removal of the thinnings, or intercropping with onions to disguise the smell of the carrot), but the best way is to build a vertical barrier around the crop as the flies stay near the ground, normally below 50cm.
- 4} Leeks are a very undemanding crop, but need careful trans-planting and earthing up to produce long, well-blanched plants. There are early, midseason and late varieties and each will require a different time for the seed to be sown. They are generally trouble free, but may suffer from rust, which is a fungal disease, causing orange spots on the leaves. Lift any affected plants and burn or put in your 'green' bin.

In conclusion, a quote from Frank McKinney Hubbard, an American cartoonist, who said:

"In order to live off a garden you practically have to live in it."





It can be reported on **101**, via the single online home function on the **Lincolnshire Police Website**, direct to community safety teams within your local district council (please be mindful this would be office hours) or via **Crimestoppers**.

#### NOTES FROM THE PARISH COUNCIL MEETING HELD ON THURSDAY 06 MARCH 2025

There were two members of the public present, together with County Cllr Bowkett and Dist Cllr Jones. Potholes in the A16 were reported (these have been reported on FixmyStreet). The grass verge on Horbling Lane is 3" higher than the footway due to preparations for slurry sealing when the grass and earth was just placed on top of the edge of the verge rather than removed. County Cllr Bowkett reported that this footway is going to be looked at in due course. Stickney Lane is breaking up due to the amount of very heavy traffic using it, the drops off the road are over 12" in some places. Would local businesses sponsor speed indicator signs that are currently on offer?

#### **Declarations of Interest**

There were no declarations of interest

#### **County Cllr Bowkett reported by email:**

The County Council elections will go ahead in 01 May alongside the Mayoral Election for Greater Lincolnshire. LCC will set an increase of 2.99% to its section of the Council Tax. The net budget for 2025/26 is £690m. Anglian Water are working to protect Hall Lane residents from flooding, some dropped kerbs are to be removed. Highways officers have visited Stickney to have a look at the drainage situation along with other highways issues. LCC asked for details of the supplier of the glass in the defibrillator box. The Property Team are looking at the situation with flooding at the picnic site.

#### **Dist Cllr Jones reported:**

Planning for a traveller site at East Fen Lane has been refused. Devolution will remove one tier of Local Government. ELDC removed itself from talks about the siting of a nuclear waste plant. The District Councillors have £4000 each to give in grants for 2025/26. Council tax increases were reported.

#### Dist CIIr Ashton reported:

The Government are using incorrect figures to give ELDC a housing target, it seems caravans are included in the figures. There is no point on changing the local plan if not physically able to meet targets, with the need of labour and materials. ELDC are looking to set up an enforcement team to check tourist caravan sites for long term occupation.

#### Planning applications received

There is no information available to the Parish Council for any decision on: S/086/00283/25 – Planning Inspectorate - Consultation from the Planning Inspectorate on the Scoping Opinion in relation to Ossain Off-shore Wind Farm

### Cemetery

A local person will be asked if they can deal with the moles in the cemetery. Local companies will be sought to give quotations for the re-surfacing of the tarmac path in the cemetery. A quotation has been received to re-set all the posts and repair the chain where required. It was discussed and resolved to keep the quotations and have a look at the trees to see what needs to be cut back at this time. A grant will then be considered for all the works to be carried out.

## The church clock - winding and repairs to rope

The Handyman is no longer able to wind the clock and work in the cemetery.

A local volunteer has offered to wind up the clock, this offer has been accepted.

The bell ringers suggest that the Parish Council are responsible for the broken rope on the hammer stop, a quote has been sought to replace this rope.
