Kiddies Corner

Healthier Flapjacks

Ingredients

- oil, for greasing
- 100g/3½oz butter, cubed
- 100g/3½oz golden syrup
- 50g/1¾oz mixed seeds,
- 50g/1¾oz dried cranberries
- 50g/1¾oz raisins
- 50g/1¾oz dried apricots, cut into sixths
- 250g/9oz jumbo porridge oats (gluten-free, if required)
- 1 large free-range egg, beaten



Method

1. Preheat the oven to 200C/180C Fan/Gas 6. Lightly oil a shallow 20cm/8in loose-based square cake tin and line the base and sides of the tin with baking parchment.
2. Melt the butter and syrup together in a large saucepan over a low heat, stirring regularly with a wooden spoon. Take off the heat and stir in the seeds, cranberries, raisins and apricots and oats. Stir in the egg.
3. Spoon into the prepared tin and press until well flattened. (It's important that the oats are pressed well, so that they stay firm enough to cut when baked. Use the back of a metal spoon to make sure they are fully compressed). Bake for 18–20 minutes, or until golden and lightly browned around the edges.
4. Mark the flapjack into 12 pieces without cutting all the way through, this will make it easier to cut the flapjack when it's cool. Leave until cold then cut the flapjack with a sharp knife.
5. Store in an airtight container, interleaved with baking parchment or foil for up to three days.

ANNUAL PARISH MEETING HELD ON THURSDAY 22 MAY 2025

The meeting was chaired by Cllr Edwards and attended by 24 members of the public and Dist Cllr Jones

The minutes of the Annual Parish Meeting held on 04 April 2024 were read out, approved and signed
The Chairman gave the annual report:

“Thank you for attending the Annual Parish Meeting. It is wonderful to see so many faces.

Firstly, I would like to thank the kind volunteers who have been willing to give up their time to conducting several jobs in and around the village. Jobs carried out include litter picking, distributing the Stickney News magazine published by the Parish Council, checking the cemetery and churchyard regularly and winding the church clock. I think we can all agree it is lovely to hear the chimes echo through the village every hour again.

2024-2025 has been a successful year for Stickney. A few new additions, notably the puffin crossing on the A16, after around 15 years of continued pressure by the Parish Council, and latterly support from County Councillor Bowkett, it was installed bringing much needed road safety. Road resurfacing and footpath slurry sealing quickly followed finishing with new lines painted on the roads.

We have been working closely with the Lincolnshire Road Safety Partnership, District Council and County Council to purchase and erect new reactive speed signs at the four main entrances of the village to heighten the awareness of the speed limits within the village.

Village groups have benefited from the District Council grants this year. These include the bowls club and gardening club. Stickney has looked beautiful and been full of colour throughout the seasons, thank you.

A thank you goes to District Councillors Ashton and Jones for their continued attendance at the monthly Parish Council meetings. They have shared valuable information and given parishioners the opportunity to speak and ask questions directly face to face.

I hope you have had the opportunity to go and have a look at the bus shelter opposite the secondary school. William Lovell art students worked hard last summer designing and creating a mural for us all to enjoy. The Parish Council sponsored the project and dedicated it in memory of Margo Bolland, our late Chairwoman.

December saw our annual Christmas light illumination in the church yard. As usual it was very well attended and even Father Christmas made an appearance. The Parish Council team put on a wonderful spread of homemade pastries and cakes, and we warmed our toes with mulled wine, tea, coffee and hot chocolate.

I would like to thank the Clerk Edwina Arnold and all the Parish Councillors for the endless hard work in front and behind the scenes. We have an active WhatsApp group to help with communication between meetings, aiding planning for events and supporting the village doing unseen jobs such as routine checks of the play area, moving the 30mph speeding signs around the village, organising bins to be emptied, or doing it themselves if needed and attending additional meeting such as police updates.

Members also volunteer to represent the Parish Council on other boards such as The William Lovell Foundation and as trustees on the Consolidated Charity Trust.

We have a Parish Councillor currently researching information to prepare for the application of a local neighbourhood plan which will influence development in Stickney. With a newly appointed mayor and the District Council and County Council merger afoot it is likely that more responsibilities will filter down to Parish Council level and such plans will become important going forward.

It is very fulfilling being part of this enthusiastic, and forward thinking Parish Council. We will continue to do our best being the voice of the village and look forward to what 2025 will bring.”

Following this the speakers were introduced:

There were four representatives from the NHS Primary Care Network:

The Primary Care Network covers seven surgeries between Mablethorpe and Old Leake, with a total of 83,000 patients.

There are various issues covered by the PCN: isolation; mental health and well-being; physiotherapy; occupational therapy and pharmacy with cancer care and dementia care to be included at a later date. All the issues the PCN help with will take pressure off the GP as patients can self-refer to the service they feel will help them, for example an appointment can be made direct to see the physiotherapist without first visiting the GP.

Social isolation can be an issue where a person living alone in a remote area and can no longer get out and about, visits to chat to the person and will be arranged and methods of getting them out to some social groups would be considered. Visits can be made to elderly people who have left hospital and gone to a care home prior to getting them back into their own home, to chat and make sure their needs are being met.

Mental health and well-being have a person in each surgery for patients to access if they feel they need someone to talk to and help them. The person is not just surgery based, they will visit a patient at home and work with them to set achievable goals suitable to help with the situation of the individual patient.

Medication can be a problem for some patients. The pharmacy team can look at a patient's prescribed medication and help them to get it right when required, or suggest other things that may help. This gives patients the confidence that they are taking the correct medication and can make others feel better by cutting back or changing medication.

The PCN work with over 18's only, but are looking to include vulnerable young people.

The PCN is mainly based in Mablethorpe, but travel to where they are needed across the seven surgeries. There is no set criteria for the work, just work where and when they are needed.

The Chairman thanked the speakers for the information.

Members of the public attending made the following comments:

Speeding at Horbling Lane is still an issue. The recent speed check should have been carried out in the middle of Horbling Lane, not near to the junction with the A16.

A request was made for a speed camera at Horbling Lane.

Refreshments were served to all present and representatives from the Outdoor Bowls club, the Garden Club and the Walking Group were present to chat to anyone interested in joining the groups.

NOTES FROM THE PARISH COUNCIL MEETING HELD ON THURSDAY 05 JUNE 2025

There were five members of the public present, together with Dist Cllr Jones. It was reported that the attendees at the Annual Parish Meeting found it hard to hear the speakers, a microphone was offered for the next public meeting. Questions were asked about the weeds already growing through the recently slurry sealed footway at Horbling Lane. There is a crack in the footway from No35 Horbling Lane to the bridge, this will be reported to the new County Councillor. Stickney History Group were given permission to use the Parish Council records at the exhibition in September. The 30mph speed signs will be moved to Hall Lane and to Horbling Lane. It was reported that free 30mph signs are available from the LRSP. Can the Speed camera van visit the Main road in Stickney? Flooding may cause an issue at a development off Main Road, residents should advise ELDC and Witham Fourth IDB. A chair has been dumped in Horbling Lane, this should be reported on Fix my Street.

Declarations of Interest

There were no declarations of interest

County Cllr Hume reported that she had attended, and is still attending, training. She hopes to be at the July meeting with answers to questions emailed after the May meeting.

Dist Cllr Jones reported:

The planning department will be informed about the potential flooding at Main Road properties. It is important to do a Neighbourhood Plan for the Local Authority to refer to for future planning applications. ELDC are working on a 5 year housing plan hence the necessity for Neighbourhood plans. Both LCC and ELDC have withdrawn from discussions regarding the Nuclear Waste Site at Theddlethorpe. The dog ban on some of East Lindsey beaches is now in force. All households are going to be provided with an indoor food recycling caddy which, when full, will be emptied into the outdoor food recycling bin. The outdoor bin is about half the size of a normal waste bin. This will be rolled out before March 2026. Elif grants of up to £25,000 and Councillor Community Grants are still available. ELDC have appointed a S106 officer to deal with funding requests from the NHS and Education Departments and put them to developers for payment. A question was asked about the protection of Yellow Hammers (birds) as there are some nesting locally. Dist Cllr Jones advised that the Planning Department should be informed.

Christmas 2025

The cost of Christmas 120m of Christmas lights, commercial rated, together with battery boxes and batteries will be in the region of £350.00. It was resolved to ask Dist Cllr Ashton for a Community grant towards these costs.

Planning applications received

OBJECTIONS were made to the following applications:

02233/25/FUL - Mr S Halliday - Change of use of land to use for the stationing of caravans for residential purposes (works complete) at land Adjoining Mill House, Main Road

The sight lines for pulling out of the site entrance onto the A16 are very short, the access is opposite the car park entrance to the surgery too. The land levels are already raised and this is causing flooding to neighbouring properties gardens. Both the brown and grey waste water from this site is going directly into a dyke and not through a septic tank. The Public footpath should be maintained and clearly marked and respected by those driving to the site and Mill House. The access is by private road and not a public right of way named Sunny Lane.

Planning applications received - continued

02386/25/RVC - Clarke Construction Group - Section 73 application to vary conditions 2 (approved plans), 4 (vehicular and pedestrian access) and 6 (surface water) previously imposed on planning permission S/169/01314/21 for erection of 9 dwellings at land adjacent to Perivale, Main Road
Properties 1 and 2 do not have a turning point and they are very near the access to the development. The access position does not show the proximity of the roads accessing the A16 on the opposite side, it will be between Stickney Meadows and Stickney Chase. Recently there has been some serious accidents in this area of the A16. The levels of the site must not be raised too high so that flooding in the gardens of neighbouring properties is prevented.
