Ingredients

500 g beef mince 1 egg 1/2 cup tasty cheese (grated) 1/2 cup dried breadcrumbs 1/2 tsp salt 1/2 tsp pepper **Topping** 2 tbs seeded mustard 2 tbs tomato sauce

<u>Method</u>

- 1. Preheat oven to 200°C. Line a baking tray with baking paper and set aside.
- 2. In a bowl combine the beef mince, egg, salt, pepper, 1/2 cup of cheese and breadcrumbs.
- 3. Shape the mixture into 4 loaves or press into the individual slots of an oiled muffin tin.
- 4. Brush the top of each little meatloaf with 1 tsp of mustard and 1 tsp of tomato sauce each. Place a quarter of the cheese on the top of each miniloaf.
- 5. Bake for 20 minutes.

Gardening Tips for August and September:

Nothing makes the year fly past so quickly as writing these gardening notes. We are already thinking about September and unless you are one of those who like them al dente, it'll soon be time to start thinking about putting on the Brussel Sprouts for Christmas!

In the meantime here's a few jobs to be getting on with in the vegetable garden:

August: The vegetable garden is a treat this month. There is plenty of home produce to harvest, fruits of all our earlier labours.

(1) As runner bean plants reach the top of their support it is a good idea to pinch out the tops. This encourages side-shooting and ensures there are more beans at a manageable height for picking.

(2) Water sweetcorn plants regularly and feed with tomato food to get the best cobs. The cobs will be ready to harvest when you can pop a corn with a thumbnail and the juices appear milky.

(3) Keep an eye on your onion bed. Lift and dry them (and shallots and garlic) once the foliage has flopped over and yellowed. Either tie them in bundles at the neck and hang them in a dry place or store them in onion bags to prevent them from going mouldy.

(4) Harvest French and Runner beans regularly to prevent them from becoming stringy. Leaving mature pods to set seed can prevent further flowers developing.

September:

(1) Continue to sow spinach and cover them with cloches as the weather cools. By doing so you will have a picking throughout autumn and into winter.

(2) Spring cabbage can be sown in modules in the greenhouse ready for planting out later.

(3) Sow winter-hardy spring onions {White Lisbon are a favourite} for early crops next year.

- (4) Winter lettuce such as Arctic King can be sown directly into the ground now.
- (5) Garlic bulbs can be planted at the end of the month.

In the conclusion, a late sixteenth century proverb: 'September blow soft till the fruit's in the loft'

DRIVERS BEING TARGETED WITH FAKE FINES

What you need to know

Action Fraud have received an increase in reports and intelligence where elderly victims are being targeted by individuals purporting to be police officers or traffic wardens. The victims are being approached whilst parked in a car park and are told by the suspect that they have parked illegally or broken a speed limit and a photo has been taken of their car for 'evidence'.

Victims are advised that they will face a substantial penalty fine unless they pay a smaller upfront fee immediately. Victims, who opt for paying the smaller penalty, will be directed to a parking meter and asked to enter their card and PIN. These parking meters have been tampered with by the suspect in order to retain the victim's card.

Once the victim inserts their card and is asked for their PIN, the victim is shoulder surfed for their PIN by the suspect. Once victims input their PIN, the card is retained by the machine and victim is told by the suspect to seek help from the company who operates the parking meter or their bank.

What you need to do

- If you are suspicious about the <u>authenticity</u> of the fine, do not pay it until you have <u>verified</u> it with your local Council.
- Always <u>shield your PIN</u> from view when using an ATM machine, and <u>never</u> share your PIN with anyone.
- If your bank card is retained by any ATM machine, contact your bank <u>immediately</u> to inform them.

Reports From Representatives on Outside Bodies

County Cllr Bowkett reported by email:

A meeting will be arranged to discuss the request for an extension of the 30mph speed limit at Main Road. A meeting will be arranged with LCC to discuss broadband speeds in the area and how to improve them as funding to do this is available.

Play Area

The bolts have been replaced in the 'steps' on the multi-use item. Paint is available from Wicksteed to cover the graffiti, but it is very expensive. It was resolved to try and remove some of the graffiti before considering painting.

<u>Highways</u>

Problems with a hedge and highway sight lines will have to be reported to LCC. Vehicles parking on the footway in various areas of the village will be reported to the PCSO. The pot holes at Holmes Road have re-appeared and will be reported to LCC. Two very large and deep pot holes at Scarborough Bank. A grate has moved from a kerbside onto the verge of the Main Road, in the area of Sunnyside Farm. The road at Mary Lovell Way will be adopted by LCC when the contractors, appointed by the developer, have completed the roadworks. Permission has been given for the Parish Council to site a seat at the entrance to Mary Lovell Way, this will be a WW2 commemorative seat.

Stickney Community Speed Watch – Co-ordinator required



Stickney was one of the first villages to set up a Community Speed Watch. At the beginning of the scheme speeds of up to 70mph in a 30mph area were recorded, now, the fastest 'speeders' are in the 40's. Although we haven't cured the problem of speeding vehicles in the village, we are well on the way to educating people to adjust their speeds and mind sets.

It would be a shame to lose the momentum by allowing the scheme to end.

The scheme has some volunteers, but no one is available to take on the role of the Coordinator.

I'd like to explain what the role involves, to try and encourage someone to take on this role:

- The Coordinator is the person that keeps the equipment safe at their house.
- ✓ They arrange a team of 3 people to carry out a monitoring session at the road side, but DON'T have to take part themselves.
- They can, if they want to, enter the details of the recorded vehicles onto a spreadsheet to email for the letters to be sent, again they DO NOT have to do this, any team member can do it.

Training will be available from the Lincolnshire Road Safety Partnership
