<u>Laptop Donations to New Leake and Stickney Primary Schools to</u> <u>support remote learning (during lockdown)</u>

Sivill Service (a Tattershall-based company specialising in the repair and servicing of devices) have joined the BBC Make a Difference campaign by putting their skills to great use though reconditioning laptops generously donated by members of the public. Sivill Service set up this wonderful scheme with the aim of enabling all children to be able to participate in remote learning during these challenging times, by donating the reconditioned laptops to schools to loan to families who need them.

We were delighted that we were selected to receive an allocation of ten reconditioned laptops for each school.

These laptops are providing much-needed support to families who are doing their best with what they have, but who have benefitted from an additional device. Many families will have a device in their household, but to be set up to access learning at home for each child is not something any of us predicted would be needed. Our children are able to access daily live lessons from their classteachers and teaching assistants, as well as having the technical equipment necessary to complete work planned, therefore ensuring the ongoing planned curriculum across both schools is accessible for all.

Recycling is a very important part of life at our schools too, and this is another type of recycling, which we are able to discuss with our children, and to show the key benefits of not just throwing things away, but how, through companies such as Sivills, technical equipment can also be reused and continue to be useful to others.

This project shows what a difference can be made to the lives of others by people pulling together as a community, especially in these extremely challenging times. Our parents and carers are being amazingly supportive with regard to all aspects of the remote learning we are providing, however the ability to provide actual devices for so many children has been a tough challenge for schools.

We would like to send a huge thank you to Kelly and her team at Sivill Service and to those people who have donated their laptops from the whole community at Stickney and New Leake Primary Schools for such a generous gesture. We would like to assure them it will make a huge difference by enabling more children to be able to access their learning effectively and therefore engage more fully whilst keeping themselves and their families safe at home.

Ingredients

100g butter, roughly chopped
300g dark chocolate (such as Bournville),
broken into squares
3 tbsp golden syrup
140g rich tea biscuit, roughly crushed
12 pink marshmallows, quartered (use scissors)


2 x 55g bars Turkish delight, halved and sliced (or use Maltesers, Milky Way or Crunchie bars)



Method

- 1. Gently melt the butter, chocolate and syrup in a pan over a low heat, stirring frequently until smooth.
- 2. Cool for about 10 mins.
- 3. Stir the biscuits and sweets into the pan until well mixed.
- 4. Pour into a 17cm square tin lined with foil and spread the mixture to roughly level it.
- 5. Chill, until hard, then cut into fingers.





Gardening Tips for April

As I write it appears that the weather doesn't know what to do with itself. It's sunny and bright one moment and the next the heavens open and it's squally showers again. March and April can be tricky months and the lesson learnt seems to be, to be ready to seize the moment when the weather allows, but to have some indoor jobs in reserve just in case. Here then are a few jobs to be getting on with as and when the weather is clement enough.

- 1) One thing we can do is to ensure that the ground we will shortly be sowing our seeds into, is as warm as possible. This can be achieved by placing cloches or cold frames on the top of the soil. Horticultural fleece covers are useful substitutes, or even a covering of plastic sheets will ensure good germination conditions when the time comes.
- 2) By now first early potatoes should be chitting on bright windowsills. If you check your tubers regularly, you will see whether or not you have the 'eyes' pointing upwards not always easy to determine when you first buy your potatoes, as I've found to my cost!
- 3) Now is the time to be planting out onion and shallot sets. It's a bit too soon to be thinking about planting out earlier sown onions grown from seed, but they can be being hardened off in a cold frame in a sheltered spot.
- 4) I like sowing my first lots of beetroot in modules and placing them in a propagator. In next to no time they will be ready to go into the ground with the added advantage of you being able to space them well.
- 5} Early peas can be sown now using a tip Sarah Raven recommends, of sowing the seeds in compost in a strip of gutter in the greenhouse and then slipping the germinated plants into a prepared shallow trench. Tricky, but rewarding.

In conclusion, a joke I chuckle at every time I think of it, which may strike a note with gardeners:

Q. What's red and invisible?

A. No tomato!

Bug Hotels

Ever thought about building a bug hotel in your garden to encourage hedgehogs and insects which, in turn, will encourage the birds?

Here is an idea of items you can use:



An old pallet, cut to size to suit the garden

Old bricks, tiles and/or big stones

Strong cardboard

Straw, moss and dried leaves

Logs and/or twigs

Old wooden pallets are perfect for a large hotel, as they are sturdy and come with ready-made gaps.

Start by laying some bricks on the ground as sturdy corners. Leave some spaces in between the bricks – try creating an H-shape.

Add three or four layers of wooden pallets on top of your bricks. If you leave larger ends, you're more likely to attract hedgehogs.

You can also make a smaller structure, depending on the wood, bricks and space you have available.

Bugs are having a tough time due to old walls being knocked down. The cracks and crevices where the bugs shelter, live and breed are being destroyed.

A bug hotel is simple and a great way of recycling. They also provide all kinds of creepy crawlies with somewhere to live!

If you have some space, have you thought about planting some wild flowers for the bees?



WITHAM FOURTH DISTRICT IDB

It is fair to say that, so far the winter of 2020/21 has been kinder to us than 2019/20. The total annual rainfall in 2020 for the Witham Fourth District was approximately 600mm, some 240mm less than 2019 where we recorded 840mm for the year. None the less by Christmas the ground in the District was completely saturated and with this the risk of slips occurring always increases. Some residents may be aware of the recent slip on the Fodderdyke which will, unfortunately, require the road to be closed for the duration of the work which will be completed through January and February 2021.

2020 has been a busy year, the Boards operations Team have flail mown over one million metres of watercourse banks and cleared the vegetation from the channel of over half a million metres of watercourse. In addition, there has also been the programme of slip repairs, bushing, culverting and mudding works delivered as well.

Pumping Station Teams have also been busy maintaining and repairing engines, pumps and equipment at the Boards nine pumping stations.

Apologies: Apologies were accepted from Cllrs Sherriff and Cooper

Present: Cllrs Lawrence, Pritchard, Pavely, Edwards and Bolland (Chairman)

Reports from Representatives in Outside Bodies

Dist Cllr Jones reported:

Lincolnshire is currently in Tier 3 restrictions in light of the spread of Covid 19. There are Covid 19 testing stations at Skegness and at Manby. CCTV is to be installed in taxis, this will cost between £100 and £150 per vehicle.

County Cllr Bowkett reported:

The LCC Resilience Forum is still working and available for anyone in need of any help. The Covid 19 numbers for East Lindsey are 268/100,000 and for Boston 501/100,000. One of the Lincolnshire United Hospitals will receive the vaccine for distribution. The 30mph signs for the north of the A16 should be ready for siting. The test for a 30mph speed limit for the south end of the A16 will take place when it is possible to do so. There are two new picnic tables at the picnic area, six have been removed, will the others be replaced? County Cllr Bowkett will look into this. The banks at the East Fen Drainside have been churned up by farmers and the River Authority, the public footpath is now in a very poor condition for walkers.

Dist Cllr Ashton reported:

Planning meetings are being held virtually and the technology allows for public speaking time, this is working well.

The PCSO reported by email:

The PCSO's will keep an eye on the play area and the cemetery when they are in the area. Lincs Alert will no longer be used as the Police are now posting issues and information on the Nextdoor social media site. The Chairman will advise the Clerk of any items for the magazine.

Reports from Representatives in Outside Bodies

Dist Cllr Jones reported:

Seminars are available to consider the new housing strategy for East Lindsey, the aim is to try and spread housing to some smaller villages. There is £1000 in funding available for anything Covid related. The bin collections have been disrupted due to the workforce having to isolate due to Covid.

County Cllr Bowkett reported:

LCC have received £12.5m of extra funding for small business support; single lane roads and works on dykes. £5000 is available for households affected by flooding, this is on a first come first served basis. LCC are aiming to be zero carbon by 2050. The Covid vaccine programme is going well in East Lindsey.

The PCSO reported:

There is a problem in Stickney with fly-tipping, if anyone knows who is doing this please report to the Police. Speeding at Fodderdyke Bank into Horbling Lane will be checked with a radar gun in due course. Hare coursing and poaching is an issue in the area, please report anything on 101. Lincs Alert is coming to an end. The Police post on Nextdoor, but the site is not monitored and they cannot see comments made. Always report incidents on 101 or 99 where appropriate

Planning applications received

Grass Cutting 2021

Following discussion it was resolved that the contractors who cut the cemetery, the play area and the public footpaths in 2020 would continue for 2021.

Play Area

The play area annual inspection has taken place, there is only one issue to be dealt with, the swings need the seats replaced. Bolts have been received to replace the missing ones. Due to the amount of rain the play area has had some flooding.

Apologies: Apologies were accepted from Cllr Cooper

Present: Cllrs Lawrence, Pritchard, Pavely, Edwards, Cockburn and Bolland (Chairman)

Reports from Representatives in Outside Bodies

Dist Cllr Jones reported:

Skegness and Mablethorpe have been awarded Government funding of £48m for the Towns Fund scheme. The Housing Strategy Plan has been agreed at ELDC and will be out for consultation – please respond in the sections that affect Stickney (This will be on the ELDC website).

The District Councillor grants of £1000, to be Covid related, and £500, for community use, have been applied for by the school and the Parish Council respectively. There should be no problems with the applications. District Cllr Jones was asked about cutting down trees and hedges – they should not be cut after the end of February due to nesting birds. District Cllr Jones will advise the Parish Council of the rules for bonfires. The Clerk will report fly tipping of tyres and fridges in a lane by Hagnaby Lock.

County CIIr Bowkett reported:

An extra £12.5m is being given to LCC for rural roads and flooding. LCC are aiming to be zero carbon by 2050. The vaccination programme is going well. Rural business grants are available.

The PCSO reported by email:

The Nextdoor social media site is not monitored by the Police, residents should call 101 to report incidents or 999 when necessary. Speed checks have been carried out at Horbling Lane, further checks will be carried out. Any issues at the picnic site should be reported to the Police on 101.

District Councillors Community Grant

The District Councillor grant application forms have been completed by the primary school PTFA, this is to fund two laptops, with head phones, which are to be used by students in school and can also be lent to any student who may have to isolate in the coming months. The Parish Council application is to fund the removal of a dead tree in the churchyard.

Viking Link

Viking Link were unaware there are two schools in Stickney. The schools will have Community Engagement with regard to the environment and archaeology provided by Viking Link. Nothing has been done with regard to loneliness due to Covid.

The Boston Flood Barrier Gate

The Boston Barrier gate is now fully ready and working to give an enhanced level of flood protection to over 13,000 homes and businesses in the town.

As the centrepiece of the flood scheme, the barrier gate can be raised in just 20 minutes, responding quickly to threats of North Sea tidal surges.

With the whole of the £100m Environment Agency scheme now two-thirds complete, the project will provide Boston with one of the best standards of flood defence outside of London. Once the scheme is fully completed in 2022, flood risk to over 14,000 homes and 800 businesses will be greatly reduced and allow for the effects of climate change for the next 100 years.
